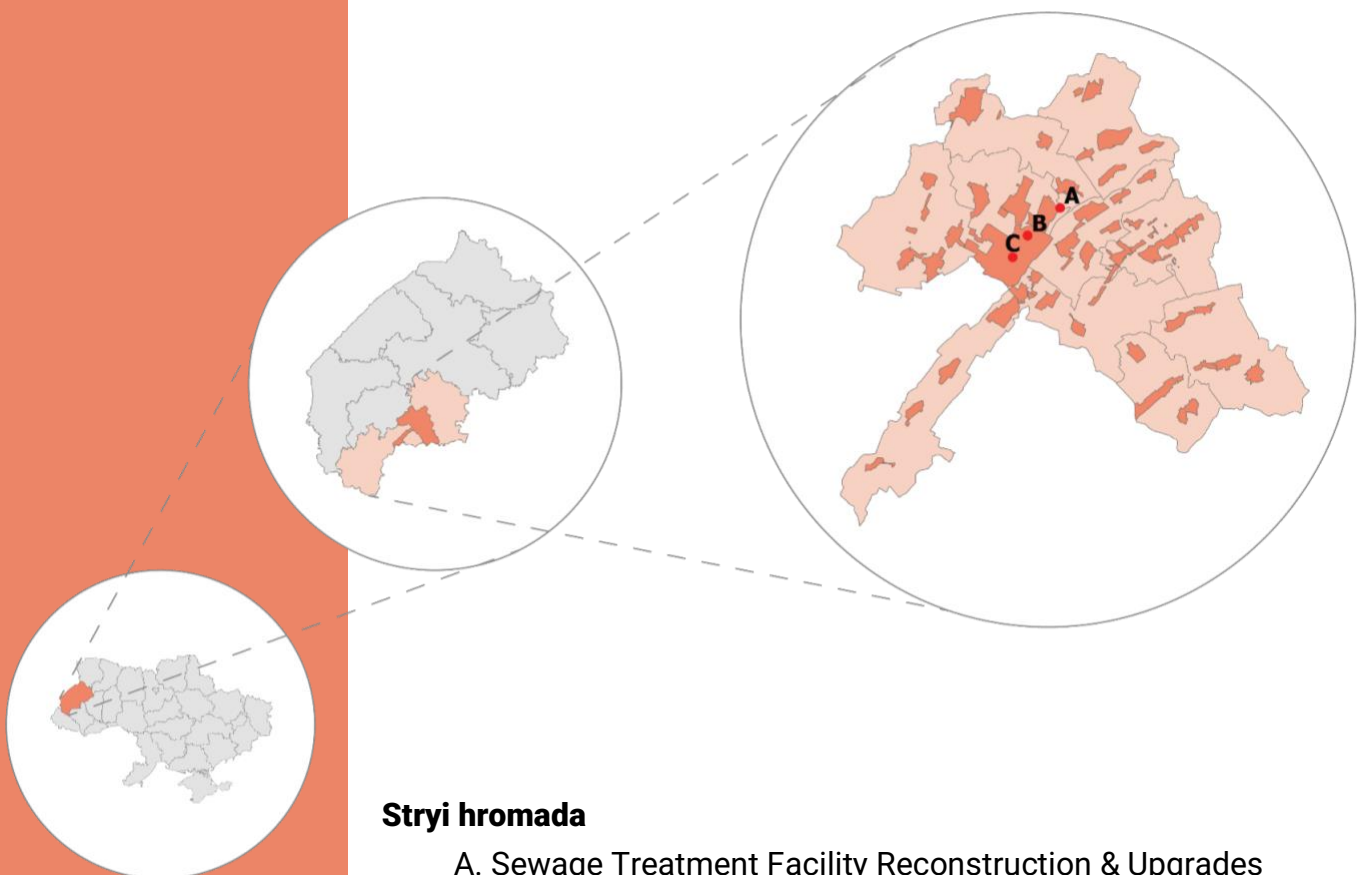

Stryi hromada, located in Lviv oblast, covers an area of 551 km² and is home to 105,288 people, including 97,421 permanent residents and 7,867 internally displaced persons who settled in the community following the full-scale invasion. The hromada comprises Stryi city as its administrative centre, one additional settlement, and 45 surrounding villages. While situated far from the frontline, Stryi has become a key destination for displaced households, increasing demand for housing, healthcare, social services, and local infrastructure. At the same time, economic shocks linked to the war have affected the hromada's agriculture and manufacturing sectors.

The rapid population increase has intensified pressure on ageing infrastructure and basic services, including the sewage treatment plant and other utility networks. Changing demographic patterns have also heightened demand for accessible public spaces and services that support young people and families across the hromada. Addressing these pressures remains central to maintaining service provision and local economic stability. The hromada is seeking co-funding for the following priority infrastructure and service projects, identified as among the most critical for Stryi's recovery and future resilience as of March 2026.

Sewage Treatment Facility

Reconstruction & Upgrades (est. EUR 7,700,000)

Background

Stryi's sewage treatment facilities are ageing and no longer operate reliably, creating environmental risks for the surrounding watershed. The treatment plant, commissioned in 1978, operates with severely deteriorated structures and outdated equipment, and several components no longer function properly. As a result, wastewater treatment performance is inconsistent, and untreated discharge can contaminate nearby waterways. The Stryi River flows into the Dniester basin, meaning failures at the plant affect a much wider river system.

Targeted international support is already underway. UNICEF recently supported the hromada by rehabilitating several inlet structures and providing mechanical screening equipment at three locations. While this work stabilises part of the network, it addresses only a limited portion of the infrastructure. A comprehensive reconstruction of the treatment plant is needed to restore reliable wastewater treatment, reduce pollution risks, and secure the long-term operation of this critical municipal utility.

Project Summary

The project will reconstruct and modernise the Stryi municipal wastewater treatment plant, using the existing layout of major structures. The capacity of the facility is currently limited to approximately 4,649 m³ of wastewater per day, using equipment that is heavily deteriorated and no longer meets modern treatment standards. Reconstruction will upgrade the full treatment process, including mechanical and biological treatment stages, and increase plant capacity to approximately 20,000 m³ per day.

Works will include installation of new inlet screens, grit removal systems, aeration equipment, pumping systems, and sludge dewatering units. The system will be upgraded to improve the removal of suspended solids from treated wastewater. The scope also includes reconstruction of the main pumping station, installation of large submersible pumps, and repairs to piping systems within the treatment facility. Existing treatment structures, including reception chambers, aeration tanks, and secondary settling tanks, will undergo structural rehabilitation involving significant concrete repair, metalwork, and replacement of corroded components. The discharge collector will also be rehabilitated. Electrical, ventilation, and automated control systems will be modernised to improve operational reliability and energy efficiency. The project is expected to extend the facility's operational life by approximately 25 years.

Budget

The current cost estimate is UAH 392,588,510, equivalent to approximately **EUR 7,700,000**. This figure is based on the hromada's completed project and cost documentation, including subsequent adjustments, state examination, and an approved environmental impact assessment. Operation and maintenance after completion will remain the responsibility of KP "Stryvodokanal".

The primary beneficiaries are households, enterprises, and institutions connected to Stryi's centralised wastewater system. Based on project documentation, post-reconstruction capacity is estimated to serve approximately 133,333 people, compared with roughly 30,993 people under current capacity. The project will also support local businesses that depend on reliable sewerage services.

Schedule

The project is expected to be completed within approximately **24 months** following receipt of funding. Implementation will proceed through eight launch complexes, allowing reconstruction of treatment facilities, pumping equipment, and pipelines and utility systems to be carried out in coordinated phases. Final stages will include installation and testing of treatment equipment and commissioning of the upgraded system.

Feasibility for immediate implementation

Other considerations

- ✓ Supports Ukraine's alignment with European environmental and water management standards

Zluky Park

Renewal (est. EUR 880,000)

Background

Zluky Park, located in Stryi in Lviv Oblast, is a park-monument of landscape art of local importance covering approximately five hectares. Despite its central location and potential role as a key community gathering space, the park is in need of maintenance. Significant portions of the territory remain underdeveloped and underutilised, while existing pathways and paved surfaces are visibly deteriorating. Current amenities do not adequately serve the needs of different age groups or vulnerable populations. As Stryi continues to host residents, visitors, and internally displaced persons from regions that are closer to the front lines, the availability of safe and accessible public spaces has become increasingly important for community wellbeing and social interaction. The proposed revitalisation includes the addition of new recreational facilities such as a skate park and a basketball court. This is expected to attract visitors and provide activities that appeal to young people, helping transform the park into an active and welcoming public space and improving the urban environment.

Project Summary

The project proposes the comprehensive reconstruction of Zluky Park, a park of approximately five hectares. Works will include the rehabilitation and expansion of pedestrian pathways and park alleys, landscaping and tree planting, and the organisation of the park into clearly defined zones for active and passive recreation. New facilities will include children's play areas, a skate park, and a basketball court, providing opportunities for sports, leisure, and community activities. The project will also install energy efficient lighting, video surveillance systems, and upgraded engineering networks, while introducing inclusive pedestrian routes and improved park infrastructure to enhance accessibility, safety, and overall functionality of the park.

Budget

The total estimated cost of the project is approximately UAH 45,000,000, equivalent to **EUR 880,000**. This preliminary estimate reflects the conceptual scope of works, including park reconstruction, recreational facilities, landscaping, lighting, and supporting infrastructure. Following completion, the park will be administered and maintained by Stryi City Council.

Beneficiaries

Residents across Stryi hromada will benefit from the revitalised park, including families with children, young people, and older residents seeking safe and accessible recreational space. The park will also provide opportunities for outdoor activities and community gatherings. In total, the project will serve a population of approximately 105,288 people, including around 7,867 internally displaced persons currently living in the community.

Schedule

Following receipt of funding, the project is expected to take approximately **18 months** to complete. This period will include public consultation, preparation of design and cost estimate documentation, procurement procedures, and construction, and landscaping.

Marysi Palace

Renovation (est. EUR 600,000)

Background

Marysi Palace is a single-storey building located prominently in the heart of Stryi. Constructed in 1823, it is one of the oldest surviving buildings in the city. For many years it was operated by the Ukrainian Ministry of Health, and it has gradually fallen into disrepair. In October 2023, the Ukrainian government transferred the property to the ownership of the Stryi hromada, enabling the municipality to begin preparing for restoration. Since the start of the full-scale invasion, Stryi has received thousands of internally displaced persons, increasing demand for social services and community infrastructure. In response, the hromada has prioritised revitalising this site to preserve an important historic landmark, while creating a new cultural and community facility. The project will expand dedicated public spaces for young people, support educational, cultural, and creative activities, and provide a venue for community engagement for both residents and displaced families.

Project Summary

The project will restore the 717 square meter historic building and adapt it for use as a municipal youth and cultural centre. Works will include structural stabilisation, roof and façade repairs, and restoration of exterior architectural elements, while preserving its architectural character. The renovation of interior spaces will provide an exhibition hall, creative studios, workshop and meeting rooms, and flexible spaces for educational programmes and cultural events. A café and informal gathering areas will support daily community use and youth activities.

The grounds behind the building will be redeveloped as a public cultural plaza. This work includes landscaping, construction of an open-air amphitheatre for performances and community events, and installation of pedestrian pathways, seating terraces, and green recreation areas. These improvements will convert the currently unused site into an active cultural venue and youth hub supporting exhibitions, performances, and everyday public life in Stryi.

Budget

Based on the scale of the restoration works and the community's concept design, the total investment required for full restoration and redevelopment is roughly estimated at **EUR 600,000**. The hromada is currently developing detailed design and engineering documentation, which will confirm the final project scope and cost estimate.

Beneficiaries

The primary beneficiaries are the approximately 105,288 residents of the Stryi hromada, including around 7,867 internally displaced persons who have settled there since the start of the full-scale invasion. Young people in particular will benefit from access to the public space for education, creativity, and cultural activities.
